HOW TO GET THERE

By train

Virgin Trains operates hourly, direct services from London Euston to Liverpool Lime Street (with a journey time of just over two hours). Other long-distance rail services also operate into Liverpool Lime Street station. First TransPennine Express provides direct train services to Liverpool Lime Street from Manchester, Leeds, York and Middlesbrough.

ACC Liverpool is a 20-minute walk from Lime Street or a short taxi ride. For local travel information once you reach Liverpool visit www.merseytravel.gov.uk

By plane

Liverpool has global transport connections. Liverpool John Lennon Airport is only seven miles from the city centre, with excellent travel links across the region. The KLM service between Schiphol, Amsterdam and Liverpool connects the City Region with more than 100 destinations on KLM's own intercontinental network and over 650 worldwide destinations. A taxi from the airport to the city centre will take approximately 20 minutes or the express bus service Route 500 will take approximately 25 minutes, dropping you off within a five minute walk of ACC Liverpool.

By car
